Preseason Coaches' Selections

Big 12 head coaches selected Texas as preseason 2005 champion for the third consecutive season in their preseason poll. The Longhorns also were No. 1 nationally in three of the four major pre-2005 surveys. Five different schools have won the annual Big 12 titles since 1997, and they were Texas Tech (1997), Texas A&M (1998-99), Baylor (2000-05, co with NU), Nebraska (2001-03-05), and Texas (2002-04).

Garrido, Hays Reach 2005 Milestones Wins

As Big 12 coaches Augie Garrido (1,500-plus wins, tops among all coaches in NCAA Division I for all sports) of Texas and Larry Hays of Texas Tech reached 1,500 and 1,400 milestones, respectively, this season. Garrido notched win No. 1,500 in his 37th season as a head coach with a 8-0 Longhorns' win over Youngstown State on Feb. 27. Hays gained No. 1,400 in the Midland Rockhounds College Classic at Midland, Texas, with a 5-3 triumph over Lamar on Feb. 26. The Big 12 has solid representation among active Division I baseball coaches with two in the Top Three, and a current listing follows:

Three in CWS: A Big 12 First; Texas Triumphs

Texas won its sixth NCAA baseball championship 6-2 over Florida on June 26. Baylor, Nebraska and UT closed with a composite 6-2 mark in NCAA Super Regionals and became the first trio of Big 12 teams to make it to the NCAA Super Regionals in the same year. Baylor made its first trek to Omaha since 1978 while Texas appeared in the CWS for a record 32nd time. Nebraska, one of the hottest teams in the nation with a 11-game winning streak after downing Arizona State 5-3 on June 17, ended the season with a school-record and nation-leading 57 wins behind Big 12 Coach of the Year Mike Anderson. Baylor guaranteed at least one Big 12 team in the Sat.-Mon. championship round by downing Tulane 8-7 on June 21. The Bears lost to Texas (all-time NCAA World Series victories' leader with 76) 4-3 last on June 22. Texas is 78-53 in all NCAA appearances since 1949 and won titles in 1949-50-75-83-02-05. UT has been runnerup five times at the WS and is 6-5 in all-time title games behind only 12-2 Southern California.

Fourth-, Ninth-Largest Session Crowd in NCAA Annals in 2005

The Feb. 12, 2005, full-session turnout of 21,995 for games involving Baylor, Oklahoma State and Texas A&M was the fifth-largest in NCAA history at the Minute Maid Classic in Houston, Texas. A total of seven of the 12 largest session crowds in NCAA annals has been associated with Big 12 members. In May 2005 Nebraska and Creighton played before the ninth-largest crowd (20,011) in NCAA annals at Omaha. The record attendance figures are:

Balance in Phillips 66 Big 12 Postseason Tournaments: 1997-2005

The Phillips 66 Big 12 postseason tournament returns to Oklahoma City, Okla., for the 29th time in 31 years as the Big Eight or Big 12 tourney) on Wednesday-Saturday, May 24-28, 2006, at SBC Bricktown Ballpark. Previous winners have been Oklahoma (1997), Texas Tech (1998), Nebraska (1999-2000-01-05), Texas (2002-03), and Oklahoma State (2004).

Noting the Big 12 in NCAA World Series After '05

Big 12 schools are a composite 156-140 (8-4 in 2005) in 296 NCAA World Series contests, and Texas has advanced to Omaha a current-best four consecutive times from 2002-05. The Longhorns were the only returning school from last summer and are 2-1 in 2002-04-05 championship games. The June 18 Baylor-Texas tilt was the sixth meeting between the teams in '05, and BU ended with a 4-2 series edge. Only one team (Texas-Pan American in 1971) has downed the Longhorns five times in a year.

Speaking of No-Hitters...

The last time Big 12 teams have had no-hitters pitched against them: Baylor (1971 by Texas Tech); Colorado (1957 by Kansas); Iowa State (2000 by Baylor); Kansas (1980 by Nebraska); Kansas State (1983 by Oklahoma State); Missouri (1968 by Oklahoma); Nebraska (1981 by Missouri); Oklahoma (2005 by Texas); Oklahoma State (1976 by Kansas State); Texas (1907 by Texas A&M); Texas A&M (1986 by Arkansas); Texas Tech (2005 by Missouri). UT's 98-year stretch is second-longest in Division I behind Mississippi State with zero no-hitters since 1886. Big 12 pitchers tossed a record three no-hitters in 2005.



BAYLOR (46-23, 19-8)

Last Game: Lost to Texas 4-3 June 22
Next Game: 2006 Season Opener

The Bears closed with their top final national finish in diamond history at No. 4 in all four major national polls. BU was one of three Big 12 teams to advance from the six-team 2005 Minute Maid Classic in Houston to the NCAA World Series along with Texas and Tennessee. Baylor also won its first two contests in three trips to Omaha over Oregon State 4-3 and Tulane 8-7.

BU had a school-record nine players taken in the 2005 MLB draft, and soph LHP Cory VanAllen has been selected as a tryout for Team USA in June 27-30 trials. Head coach Steve Smith accomplished the best one-year turnaround in Baylor baseball fortunes from 29-31 in 2004 to 46-24 (plus 17 victories) in '05. Bullpen aces Abe Woody (11 saves) and Ryan LaMotta (seven) combined for 18 of BU's 19 team saves--two off the school standard of 21 in 2000.

Big 12 Did You Know? - Honors' Updates

Big 12 relief aces Abe Woody of Baylor and J. Brent Cox of Texas are on the preliminary watch list for the NCBWA Stopper of the Year Award. Four Big 12 pitching standouts are on the 2005 Roger Clemens Preseason Watch List. They are J. Brent Cox, Texas, RHP, Jr.; Mark McCormick, Baylor, RHP, Jr.; Jason Meyer, Texas A&M, LHP, So.; Clayton Turner, Texas A&M, RHP, Sr. Johnny Bench Award Watch List: Kansas C Sean Richardson, Texas C Taylor Teagarden.

Eight Big 12 standouts are current members of the 2005 Brooks Wallace Award Watch List. Included in this group are Texas Tech SS Cameron Blair, Oklahoma State 1B Adam Carr, Baylor C Josh Ford, Nebraska 3B Alex Gordon, Texas SS Seth Johnston, Texas A&M SS Cliff Pennington, Baylor IF Kyle Reynolds, Oklahoma State DH-OF-ATH Ty Wright, Oklahoma DH-ATH-IF Eric Thornton, and Texas A&M's Meyer.

Big 12 Did You Know? - CU and ISU

Iowa State played varsity baseball for 109 seasons from 1892-2001 with a few breaks for world wars and cancellation of intercollegiate play. ISU won 1,346 games and played in three NCAA tournaments with two NCAA World Series appearances.

The 1970 Cyclones won the Big Eight championship, the NCAA District 5 tournament and were fifth in the World Series. Colorado competed intercollegiately for 89 seasons (with breaks) from 1892-1980. One of the most noted head coaches was NCAA Final Four basketball official and broadcasting ace Irv Brown from 1970-78... Big 12 schools have won NCAA baseball titles in six different decades: 1940s-Texas (1949); 1950s-Texas (1950), Oklahoma (1951), Missouri (1954), Oklahoma State (1959); 1970s-Texas (1975); 1980s-Texas (1983); 1990s-Oklahoma (1994); 2000s-Texas (2002).



KANSAS (36-28, 11-15)

Last Game: Lost to Texas 9-0 May 26
Next Game: 2006 Season Opener

KU's power numbers were among the best in the conference as the Jayhawks closed with their first set of three consecutive 30-win seasons in school annals. Kansas also was not that far removed from a NCAA Regional bid with a BoydsWorld.com Pseudo-RPI in the 80s and 90s for much of the season.

Coach Ritch Price can build upon 59 team home runs--second in the Big 12 behind Oklahoma State with 84--and the slugging of junior OF A.J. Van Slyke of Ladue, Mo., with 12 homers, 57 RBI and a .323 average in a circuit with arguably the best top-to-bottom pitching in the country. OF Gus Milner provided similar pop with nine homers and 45 RBI while senior catcher Sean Richardson displayed solid defensive skills, hit .302 with six homers and 45 RBI, and was named a semifinalist for the prestigious Johnny Bench Award.



KANSAS STATE (30-25, 8-19)

Last Game: Lost at Nebraska 3-1 May 22
Next Game: 2006 Season Opener

KSU equalled its 2002 record of 30-25 and came within three runs of pulling out a series against No. 5 Nebraska in Lincoln on May 22. K-State also topped Big 12 team batting lead at .309 with 119 doubles (second in the conference) and 51 home runs (fourth in the circuit). The Wildcats had the largest increase in Big 12 team hitting from 2004 to '05 with a 50-point rise after going .259 in '04.

K-State's rebuilt pitching staff found a closer in junior Bryan Peterson (five saves in 24 appearances) and a nucleus of starters in juniors Adam Cowart (7-4) and Chase Mitchell (7-5) while Brett Muegge (4-2) and Brad Hutt (2-1, starter against Nebraska on May 21 in Lincoln) had quality outings. Junior IF Barrett Rice came on strongly at the midseason point and slugged his way into ninth place in Big 12 hitting with a .348 average, .555 slugging percentage, six homers, and 27 RBI while seeing action in 48 games. KSU has improved in the win column in each of the last two seasons under head coach Brad Hill.



MISSOURI (40-23, 16-11)

Last Game: Lost at Cal State Fullerton 8-6 June 5
Next Game: 2006 Season Opener

The Tigers not only made a trio of NCAA appearances in succession for the first time since the 1962-64 seasons, but they also notched their most wins since the 1991 MU crew closed 41-20. A season of many milestones included fourth place in the Big 12 race for the school's top finish since the 2003 squad placed fourth (a MU high since the Big 12 began competition) in the circuit.

Coach Tim Jamieson's youngsters rode the right arm of soph P Max Scherzer (9-4, 1.86 ERA, school-record 131 strikeouts in 106 1/3 innings, only three home runs allowed) and hitting of OF James Boone (.340-8 HR-72 RBI, second in the conference) to a No. 21 ranking in the BASEBALL AMERICA poll. MU's bullpen was so reliable that the team finished 38-1 when leading after eight innings. The only setback came to defending NCAA champion Cal State Fullerton in Fullerton, Calif., in the season closer as the Titans scored three times in the ninth to edge MU. Tigers' relief man still pitched in with 11 saves.



NEBRASKA (57-15, 19-8)

Last Game: Lost to Ariz. State 8-7 (11) June 21
Next Game: 2006 Season Opener

The Huskers were the first team to qualify for the NCAA World Series (their third appearance since 2001 and first under Mike Anderson as head coach) after sweeping powerhouse Miami (Fla.). The Huskers also ended as the national victories' leader for 2005 with 57. Xanthus Dick Howser Trophy recipient 3B Alex Gordon followed up his 2005 Big 12 Player of the Year laurels with both preseason and postseason BASEBALL AMERICA Player of the Year laurels, 19 home runs, 66 RBI, .372 batting average, a .715 slugging percentage (tops in the league), 63 walks (most in the Big 12), and a loop-topping .518 on-base percentage. Freshman pitcher Johnny Dorn has moved to the top of the Big 12 in wins with 12 and had a 1.98 ERA prior to the World Series where the Huskers closed fifth at 1-2.



OKLAHOMA (35-26, 14-13)

Last Game: Lost at Ole Miss 20-5 June 5
Next Game: 2006 Season Opener

The Sooners completed their 28th NCAA Regional appearance (third in the Big 12 to Texas with 47 and Oklahoma with 32) by finishing as runnerup to NCAA No. 5 seed Mississippi in the 2005 NCAA Oxford Regional. OU advanced to the finals after downing Southern Miss 5-4 and Maine 11-10 in the postseason. The Maine contest ended with a crisp 1-2-3 double play after the Bears had loaded the bases with one out in the bottom of the ninth inning.

OU's solid finish (11-5 in its last 16 games) received props from IF Ryan Rohlinger (.345-11 HR-53 RBI), who started at both third and second bases, and OF Kevin Smith with the Big 12-games-only seventh-leading batting average at .337.



OKLAHOMA STATE (34-25, 12-15)

Last Game: Lost to Texas 6-1 May 27
Next Game: 2006 Season Opener

The Cowboys missed an at-large NCAA bid by literally inches after slugging past then-No. 3 Texas 10-4 in the first round of the Phillips 66 Big 12 tourney on May 25.

As it was, coach Frank Anderson's crew paced the league with 84 home runs, including a Big 12-best 22 dingers by 1B Adam Carr of Felton, Calif. SS Chris Gutierrez of Orlando, Fla., garnered second team All-Big 12 laurels behind his first team sidekick with a .343 average, five homers and 33 RBI. Gutierrez added a solid stick to his fielding prowess, which included errorless play in OSU's 26 Big 12 round-robin clashes in 2004. Anderson also had overachieving performances from junior LHP Thomas Cowley (10-5, 3.04 ERA, 109 2/3 innings for a Top Five mark in Big 12 IP), senior righty Scott Richmond (3.00 ERA, 98 strikeouts in 99 innings) and Freshman Player of the Year OF Corey Brown (.360-13 HR-46 RBI).



TEXAS (56-16, 16-10)

Last Game: Def. Florida 6-2 June 27-
NCAA Championship
Next Game: 2006 Season Opener

Texas nabbed its sixth NCAA baseball crown (second-most in Division I history) by downing SEC power Florida in two consecutive contests. The Longhorns began the CWS by downing the Baylor Bears 5-1 on June 18 and then topped the Bears 4-3 on June 22. NCBWA Stopper of Year J. Brent Cox (8-3, 2.00 ERA, 17 saves) appeared in a NCAA World Series-record 13th career game at Omaha in the finale while striking out 12 and not allowing a run in 10 innings during five appearances. Cox finished 8-3 with 19 saves (tops nationally) and a Big 12-best 1.73 ERA. Big 12 batting champ SS Seth Johnston (.379-9 HR-66 RBI) collected a conference-season-high 115th hit against the UF. 3B David Maroul ended the CWS 8-for-16 with three home runs, eight RBI, and a .500 average. C Taylor Teagarden (.332-6 HR-31 RBI) was a finalist for the prestigious Johnny Bench Award given by the Greater Wichita Sports Association. Texas has won 271 of a national-record 416 NCAA contests since 1947. Coach Augie Garrido is 122-67 in 189 NCAA tilts since 1979.



TEXAS A&M (30-25-1, 9-18)

Last Game: Lost at Texas 11-1 May 22
Next Game: 2006 Season Opener

The Aggies and Kansas State chipped in with key triumphs on May 21 and 22 to give the Big 12 its first complete set of 10 30-game winning teams in 2005 since conference play started in 1997.

The Ags hung on for a 8-7 win over Texas in 10 innings at College Station on May 20 after All-Big 12 SS Cliff Pennington walked for the fourth time of the night and scored on a wild pitch. Kevin Whelan (4-1) came out of the bullpen again to provide the Aggies with clutch relief over 2 2/3 innings. Texas A&M joined Missouri during the regular season with a conference-best 7-2 mark at neutral sites. Some of those offsite wins included a 10-1 triumph over Tennessee in Houston at the Minute Maid Classic, a 3-1 victory over Southern California, 13-5 downing of Notre Dame in Round Rock, Texas, and a 4-3 victory at South Alabama in the Stanky Field rededication. A&M is 463-233-2 (.665) overall in the last 10 seasons.



TEXAS TECH (34-25, 9-16)

Last Game: Lost to Nebraska 2-1 May 27
Next Game: 2006 Season Opener

Tech is one of four Big 12 teams with longtime college head coaches in second careers as key assistants. Popular TCU head coach Lance Brown came out of retirement in mid-2005 to take over as a volunteer coach for head coach Larry Hays' bunch and joins former Oklahoma (later interim head coach) aide Sunny Golloway, and Texas' Tom Holliday as "new life" members of successful coaching staffs.

The Red Raiders upended eventual Phillips 66 Big 12 tourney champ Nebraska 5-3 in Game 4 of the 2005 meet in Oklahoma City before being eliminated later 2-1 by the NCAA's third-seeded team. Tech All-Big 12 SS Cameron Blair of Dallas, Texas, proved his mettle with a .350 batting average, team-leading 17 home runs and 60 RBI. Transfer 2B Joseph Callender added a .362 batting mark--fourth-highest among Big 12 batsmen prior to the opening of NCAA play. Pitcher Billy Carline (7-3) became the late-season ace of the Red Raiders' staff. Tanner McElroy had a 2.28 ERA.
